Our Purpose

The Anti-Tribalism Movement is a non-profit organisation committed to tackling tribalism and promoting fairer and more equitable societies.

The Anti-Tribalism Movement was established in 2010 to fight tribe-based discrimination. Since then it has grown into an international force with 100,000+ subscribers that strive to combat prejudice, tribalism, inequality, and violence around the world. With a dynamic support base, we have managed to spread the message of anti-tribalism within targeted communities and beyond. Our members are drawn from all segments of society and backgrounds and they have enabled us to combat tribalism and inequality over the last 10 years. We are eager to attract even more members and expand the breadth and depth of our work.

Objective

The Objectives of the Charity are to advance conflict resolution and reconciliation in communities that are adversely affected by Tribalism with a view to relieving suffering, poverty and distress and building and maintaining social cohesion and trust within and between communities by:

- Advancing education about Tribalism and its impact
- Promoting dialogue, mutual understanding, tolerance and peace within communities,
- Empowering people to challenge inherited prejudices that can cause conflict and social instability,
- Seeking to eliminate discrimination and extremist practices that can arise as a consequence of Tribalism and violence
- Conducting research on ways to counter Tribalism and publishing the results,
- Empowering young people to be active members of their communities through leadership training and other opportunities,
- Such other means as the Trustees may determine.

Our core values

Impartiality – We believe to base our decisions on objective criteria, rather than on the basis of bias, tribalism, prejudice or preferences.

Credibility – We believe to earn respect and trust through our programmes with tangible outcomes by sharing lesson learnt and achievements.

Transparent – We believe too timely and reliably disclosure ATM's financial performance.

Commitment - We believe to achieve societies free from tribalism and inequalities take time. That's why we make long-term commitments to people to resolve tribal conflicts and social inequality and promote tolerant and inclusive societies.

Future Strategic Priorities

We're a constantly evolving charity, which responds to the needs of our service users. We're now 10 years old and very proud of what we've achieved in such a short space of time. We are revisiting our business plan to reflect Covid-19 impacts to our beneficiaries, and we plan to formulate new strategic plan that will demonstrates our ambitions for the future, and it will guide our work for the next 5 years. We will reflect on what we've achieved since our formation. We will explore new ways we can work which will better meet the needs of our service users and aid our own sustainability.

Our ethos is firmly entrenched in responding appropriately to our service users' needs without being too prescriptive. The last 10 years we have helped people to become active members within the communities and develop lifelong skills to counter social divisions. To secure the future of the charity we are determined to build on our most impactful programmes including young leaders training programme, Research, Fellowship, International Somali Awards and Advocacy programme. We seek to expand the depth and strength of these programmes to realise their expected outcomes and future community impacts.

Our trustees, supporters, volunteers and staff hold a wealth of experience that we will utilise to provide professional services to all our stakeholders, including our public sector partners who rely on us to bring the voices of local people and communities to their attention. However, we also understand that it is not an easy time for charities that support local communities and that there are challenges facing all sectors, which are not to be underestimated.

Our strategic Priorities 2019-22

Encouraging Dialogue

Creating space for dialogue is essential in order to build cohesive and harmonize societies. We connect people from different clans, tribes, nations, affected by the same tribal conflict, enabling them to talk about tribalism and its impacts. Through dialogue we are able to build confidence and trust, collaborations between the different communities.

Foster Tolerance

We will work with partners to organise seminars, reconciliation conferences, trainings and events. These challenge existing stereotypes and promote understanding, tolerance awareness of peaceful ways to resolve conflicts. They help both outsiders and tribal communities better understand the complexities of each situation.

Produce Leaders

Over the next three years, we will train 90 young leaders to become role models, influence change that benefits their communities and the wider

society, to become bridgeheads enabling other young people to follow in their footsteps and to provide strategic leadership that ensures the voice and needs of their communities are represented at all levels of public decisionmarking.

Advocacy

We continue to produce policy briefings and campaigns to advocate for the communities we serve, including marginalised groups, to communicate the challenges they face to decision-makers. This work is guided by listening to affected communities and engaging civil society actors across the board to effect meaningful discourse and lasting change.

Research

We will collaborate with academics and universities to identify the root causes of tribalism. Through the findings of the researches, we develop publications for schools, policy makers, public bodies and institutions to enable them better serve those communities and counter the misuse of tribal differences.

Achievement and Performance

In 2019/20, our service delivery had been affected by Corona Virus and we are unable to deliver much for few months as some of our prominent projects such as the international Somali Awards were postponed. However, we have delivered a number of projects, researches and campaigns via offline and online over the past year including as follows:

Lead and Be Led

We have completed another year of our 'Lead and Be Led' programme, where we trained 24 young people from London and beyond to develop their leadership skills. 24 trained young people have now developed the core skills and attributes needed in today's society which emphasised on social and emotional competencies including self-awareness, collaboration, empathy, relationship- building and ability to lead through authenticity rather than by authority. The young people were also provided and supported with internships and volunteering opportunities.

Additionally, the young people have been involved in a number of social action projects with other organisations, government departments and our network of partners.

Open-Minded Debate

We continued to deliver our work to Foster Tolerance through the Open-Minded Debate, reaching 300 people over the past year. The programme is providing a safe space where the community come to discuss an important topic such hate crime, the legacy of marginalised communities and political participation. With the open-minded debate, participates always leave with a solution or even a chance to speak to a professional.

Covid-19 impacts Policy Briefings

There is evidence to show that the people of Somali origin in the UK face 'significant inequalities in accessing education, employment, health, and housing with resulting poor outcomes. They live in a web of inter-connected vulnerabilities which take on particular importance in the COVID-19 context. In April 2020, we produced three thoroughly researched collaboratively produced briefings covering a range of important issues and making urgent policy recommendations to UK government. Due to these policy briefings, we engaged with government departments, GLA, local authorities and other stakeholders to explore viable implementations of our policy recommendations.

Covid-19 BAME Resilient Grant

In partnership with Comic Relief and National Emergencies Trust, we have launched £360,000 Covid-19 BAME Resilience Grant to help voluntary sector organisations to sustain their core services and thrive in this new challenging environment we are all operating in. We have received 115 applications from the BAME voluntary sector in the United Kingdom, after a rigorous selection process there was 34 successful organisations who have been awarded grants to assist them to sustain their core services and adapt to the impact of COVID-19.

Housing Champions

We provided training, capacity building and advocacy to empower 30 local residents in White City and South Acton (mainly women) to engage with local housing regeneration and planning processes in order to provide awareness of relevant housing issues that includes a fair approach to development that takes into account issues of affordability and family-sized homes.

Financial Review

This financial year we had unrestricted income of £116,746 and restricted income of £844,204 Total incomes was £960,950. We had a surplus of £63,318 on the unrestricted income and a surplus of £438,833 on restricted income. The charity had unrestricted reserves of £108,586 and restricted reserves of £470,916.

Where does our money come from?

Anti-Tribalism Movement began as a grass-roots organisation funded by membership donations. Since then, we have diversified substantially to develop a strong income stream from trusts, foundations, corporates, members, our venue and contract from private. Throughout, volunteers, supporters and individual donors have been vitally important to us.

Our growing portfolio of restricted income grants and sponsorships are a significant contribution to our growth. We have put in place a range of mechanisms to ensure we can continue to secure institutional income from private sector, individuals, contracts and grant-making institutions.

By developing new, responsible and innovative ways of attracting supporters we are planning to secure 6-months of unrestricted reserve income by 2022. We expect to see our fundraising costs to increase as we explore new opportunities, we are confident that in doing so, we will transform relationships with our supporters in order to maximise the amount available for our charitable activities within a few years.

How do we judge the impact of our work?

We are committed to ensuring that in everything we do, we are accountable to those whom we work with and for; from our service users (communities and donors) and other stakeholders (staff and volunteers). We use several tools to monitor, evaluate and learn from our stakeholders, including:

- During the lifetime of all our projects, ATM evaluates the success of our projects from a number of areas such as; change, enjoyment, participations, development, skills gap and methodology.
- Completing review exercises to understand our outcome achievements as well as our challenges, and how we deal with them.
- Undertaking evaluations to assess our overall strategies, test the core assumptions about how we contribute to social change and assess our effectiveness in different contexts.
- Consulting with key stakeholders to gather their insights and assessments about our work and efforts.

Our findings are used both internally and externally. Internally is to strengthen our ability to manage larger programs, to review the strengths of the board and explore options on how to deal with any arising issues. Externally we share our learning, case studies, trends and analysis with funders, the wider community, members and other relevant stakeholders to promote good practice.

Public benefit statement

In shaping our objectives for the year and planning our activities, the Trustees have considered S.17 of the Charities Act 2011 and the Charity Commission's guidance on public benefit, including the guidance 'public benefit: running a charity (PD2). The achievements and activities above demonstrate the public benefit arising from the charity's activities.

Reserves Policy

Anti-Tribalism Movement's policy is to maintain a level of unrestricted and undesignated reserves equivalent to Six months' turnover. Currently we are working towards achieving this target by 2022.

Risk Management

The trustees have assessed the major risks to which Anti-Tribalism Movement is exposed, and are satisfied that systems are in place to mitigate exposure to the major risks including maintaining a risk register, which is reviewed annually.

Investment Policy

The charity does not produce a sufficient surplus to invest, as priority must be given to building our unrestricted reserves.

Plans for future periods

We have diversified substantially to develop a strong income stream from trusts, foundations, corporates, members, venue hire, supporters and individual donors.

Our growing portfolio of unrestricted income venue hire, and donations are a significant contribution to our growth. We have put in place a range of mechanisms to ensure we can continue to secure institutional income from private sector, individuals, and grant-making institutions.

Independent Examiners

The Charity appointed **BK Community Accountant Ltd** for second year running as our independent examiner.

The accounts have been prepared in accordance with the accounting policies set out in note 1 to the accounts and comply with Anti-Tribalism Movement's Memorandum and Articles, the Companies Act 2006 and the Statement of Recommended Practice "Accounting and Reporting by Charities", issued in March 2005. Notes to the financial Statement Year ended 31st August 2020

1. General Information

The Charity is a private Company Limited by Guarantee, registered in England & Wales and a registered charity in England & Wales. The address of the registered office is 5A Uxbridge Road, Shepherd's Bush, London, W12 8LJ.

2. Statement of Compliance

These financial statements have been prepared in compliance with FRS102,' The Financial Reporting Standard applicable in the UK and the Republic of Ireland', the Statement of Recommended practice applicable to charities preparing their accounts in accordance with the Financial Reporting Standard applicable in the UK and Republic of Ireland (FRS 102) (charities SORP(FRS 102)) and the charities Act 2011.

3. Accounting policies

Incoming resources

Voluntary income and donation are included in incoming resources when they are receivable except when the donors specify that they must be used in future accounting periods or donor's conditions have not been fulfilled, then income is deferred. The income from fundraising ventures is shown aross.

Donated services and facilities

Income from donated services and facilities is included in incoming resources at a valuation, which is an estimate of the financial cost borne by the donor where such a cost is quantifiable and measurable. No income is recognised when there is no financial cost borne by a third party.

Resources expended

Resources expended are included in the statement of financial activities on an accruals basis, inclusive of any VAT, which cannot be recovered. Expenditure, which is directly attributable to specific activities, has been included in these cost categories, where costs are attributable to more than one activity, they have been apportioned across the cost of generating funds on a basis consistent with the use of these resources. Cost of generating funds includes salaries, direct expenditure and overhead costs of the staff who promote fundraising including events.

Governance costs are those incurred in connection with administration of the charity and compliance with constitutional and statutory requirements.

Funds

Restricted funds are to be used for specific purpose as laid down by the donor. Expenditure, which meets these criteria, is charged to the fund together with a fair allocation of management and support costs. Unrestricted funds are donations and other incoming resources received or generated for the charitable purposes. Designated funds are unrestricted funds earmarked by the management committee for particular purposes.

Basis of preparation

The financial statements have been prepared on the historical cost basis, as modified by the revaluation of certain financial assets and liabilities and investment properties measured at fair value through income & expenditure. The financial statements are prepared in sterling, which is the functional currency of the entity.

Going concern

There are no material uncertainties about the charity's ability to continue.

Disclosure exemptions

The entity satisfies the criteria of being a qualifying entity as defined in FRS 102. As such, advantage has been taken of the following disclosure exemption: No cash flow statement has been presented for the company.

Judgements and Key Sources of Estimation Uncertainty

The preparation of the financial statements requires management to make judgements, estimates and assumptions that affect the amounts reported. These estimates and judgements are continually reviewed and are based on experience and other factors, including expectations of future events that are believed to be reasonable under the circumstances.

Fund accounting

Unrestricted funds are available for use at the discretion of the trustees to further any of the charity's purpose. Designated funds are unrestricted funds earmarked by the trustees for particular future project or commitment. Restricted funds are subjected to restrictions on their expenditure declared by the donor or through the terms of an appeal and fall into one of two sub- classes: restricted income funds or endowment funds.

Incoming resources

All incoming resources are included in the statement of financial activities when entitlement has passed to the charity: it is probable that the economic benefits associated with the transaction will flow to the charity and the amount can be reliably measured. The following specific policies are applied to particular categories of income:

- Income from donations or grants is recognised when there is evidence of entitlement to the gift, receipts is probable and its amount can be measured reliably.
- Legacy income is recognised when receipt is probable and entitlement is established.
- Income from donated goods is measured at the fair value of the goods unless this is impractical to measure reliably, in which case the value is derived from the cost to the donor or the estimated resale value can be reliably measured. No amounts are included for the contribution of general volunteers.
- Income from contracts for the supply of services is recognised with the delivery of the contracted service. This is classified as unrestricted funds unless there is a contractual requirement for it to be spent on a particular purpose and returned it unspent, in which case it may be regarded as restricted.

Resources expended

Expenditure is recognised on an accruals basis as a liability is incurred. Expenditure includes any VAT which cannot be fully recovered, and is classified under headings of the statement of financial activities to which it relates:

- Expenditure on raising funds includes the costs of all fundraising activities, events non-charitable trading activities and the sale of donated goods.
- Expenditure on charitable activities includes all costs incurred by a charity in under taking activities that further its charitable aims for the benefit of its beneficiaries, including those support costs and costs relating to the governance of the charity apportioned to charitable activities.
- Other expenditure includes all expenditure that is neither related to raising funds for the charity nor part of its expenditure on charitable activities.

All costs are allocated to expenditure categories reflecting the use of the resource. Direct costs attributable to a single activity are allocated directly

to that activity. Shared costs are apportioned between the activities they contribute to on a reasonable, justifiable and consistent basis.

Tangible Assets

All fixed assets are initially recorded at cost.

Depreciation

Depreciation is calculated so as to write off the cost or valuation of assets, less its residual value, over the useful economic life of those assets as follows:

Furniture & equipment 20% reducing balance

Defined contribution plans

Contributions to defined contribution plans are recognised as an expense in the period in which the related service is provided. Prepaid contributions are recognised as an asset to the extent that the prepayment will lead to a reduction in future payments or a cash refund.

When contributions are not expected to be settled wholly within 12 months of the end of the reporting date in which the employees render the related service, the liability is measured on a discounted present value basis. The unwinding of the discount is recognised as an expense in the period in which it arises.

4. Limited by guarantee

The company is limited by guarantee without share capital. In the event of the charity being wound up, the liability in respect of the guarantee is limited to £1 per member.

5. Pensions and other post - retirement benefits

All staff has been offered a pension contribution recognised by HMRC. All staff has opted out so there are no pension assets to administer and there is no other post – retirement benefits funded by the charity.

6. Investment Income

None Funds are held in a non-interest bearing bank account. There are no bank charges associated with the account and trustees believe the achieve value for money in respect to the services provided by the bank.
